- Initiated by the expedition cruise industry
- Cooperation between the Governor of Svalbard and mainly AECO-members
- Involving passengers in cleanups
- 3-4 tons of collected waste per season






Time line of AECO's Clean Seas Project



- August 2017: UNEP invitation to join the Clean Seas campaign
- October 2017: Project embraced by our members
- October 2017: Creation of Clean Seas working groups in conjunction with IAATO, the International Association of Antarctic Tour Operators
- April 2018: External funding received
- April 2018: Interviews for AECO's new environmental agent position
- May 2018: Environmental Agent in place


- NOK 1.8 million (≈ USD 226,000) from Svalbard Environmental Protection Fund

Spring 2018 Survey Results

Reducing single-use plastic

- High priority for 90% of members
- 15% managed to reduce plastic already
- 40% have completed their own on board assessments
- 50% list available supplies as main challenge

Cleanup Svalbard

- 70% members participate every year
- 50% members bring bags ashore every time
- 30% organize at least one dedicated cleanup on every trips
- Very little information is recorded other than location (60%) by members

- Onboard assessments to be conducted
- Share results of assessment anonymously
- Develop a list of best practices for our members
- Develop set of educational material in cooperation with UNEP
